Sue Ritchie

I am a Director of a specialist community engagement organisation which is committed to greater involvement in public decision making, and building social capital. My public sector career before this role spanned university (active citizenship), local government (Tower Hamlets), central government (Home Office). I managed one of the largest attempts at mainstreaming PB in the UK (£2.4m), and have seen genuine success in mobilising the community in a more sustainable way through some of the small scale approaches (£20 – 30k) which I have supported across the country, and within various ‘themes’ (health, planning, policing, youth services etc).

Keen to see PB develop in its original format by putting the community right at the heart of the tough decision making, I have led an Open Government Partnership manifesto proposal which asks the cabinet office to test the idea of allocating 0.25-1% of public budgets to a participatory budgeting process. The cabinet office will decide on this in the next few months. My experience of delivering PB work is extensive, covering various themes and in a wide variety of settings (from using the Community Infrastructure Levy, to commissioning youth services, and mental health, to tackling Organised Crime). Giovanni Allegretti

Giovanni Allegretti is an architect, planner and senior researcher at the Centre for Social Studies of the Coimbra University, Portugal. He is among the directors of the Ph.D "Democracy in the XXI century" and he coordinates the "PEOPLE's Observatory: Participation, Innovation and Local Powers". Expert of the European Commission for the URBACT Programme, he has worked on Participatory Budgets and Interactive Planning since 1998.

As a consultant and trainer of participatory processes, Giovanni was invited to hold professional courses by several Local Authorities (in country such Italy, France, Spain, Greece, Sweden, Portugal, Senegal Reunion Island), Universities and NGO's (in Morocco, Indonesia and India), and International Institutions (such as two courses on PB organised by the World Bank in South Africa and Senegal).

Since January 2008 Giovanni has coordinated the scientific training of the EQUAL-funded project "Participatory Budgeting in Portugal" which trained more than 600 local authorities and municipal technicians in Portugal on Participatory Budgets. At present he is the global coordinator of the international project "EMPATIA. Enabling Multichannel Participation Through ICT Adaptations"(2015-2017), funded by Horizon 2020. For the period 2014-2019, he has been elected by the Parliament of Tuscany Region as co-chair of the Independent Authority for the Guarantee and Promotion of Participation. Alex Neil MSP

Alex Neil, MSP for Airdrie and Shotts, was born in Patna, Ayrshire in 1951. He attended Dundee University, where he graduated with a degree in economics. After graduating, he became the senior researcher for the Labour Party in Scotland, until 1976 when he left Labour to help form the Scottish Labour Party. After the 1979 general election he worked in America before returning to Scotland and forming his own economic consultancy business. In 1985 he joined the SNP and stood as their candidate in the 1989 Glasgow Central by-election.

After election to the Scottish Parliament in 1999 he became firstly SNP spokesperson for social justice before chairing the Parliament's Enterprise and Lifelong Learning Committee from 2000-2003 and again 2004 till 2007. From 2007 Alex was vice-Convenor of the European and External Relations Committee and member of the Finance Committee. He was also co-Convenor of the Cross-Party Group on the Scottish Economy and on the Council of Europe's Local and Regional Authorities Association. In February 2009 he became the Scottish Government Minister for Housing and Communities. In May 2011, Alex was appointed Cabinet Secretary for Infrastructure and Capital Investment. In Sept' 2012 he became Cabinet Secretary for Health and Wellbeing. He was appointed as Cabinet Secretary for Social Justice, Communities and Pensioners' Rights in Nov' 2014.

He is on the executive committee of Participedia, an online global knowledge repository of information on participatory governance and an international co-investigator of the Spanish 'Cherry-picking' project, that is analysing the fate of proposals from participatory processes. Darren Walton,

I am a Community Inspector with the responsibility for Seaham which is a small town in the Durham Constabulary area. Seaham was historically a small mining town and since the pit closures certain areas have slowly degenerated as has relationships with the police and local authority. In early 2014 the Seaham team embarked on the Mutual Gain programme in an attempt to break down barriers and enhance community potency in the Seaham area and in particular the Deneside estate. This estate housed some third generation organised crime families. In January 2015 we held a Participatory Budget event with £26,000 available. Nearly 500 residents attended the event. As a result a number of projects have taken place in the area. The results have been astounding. The community has become more powerful, the relationship with the police is excellent and the area is now a better place to live. Further social capital is being introduced into Seaham and collectively the police, residents and the local authority will continue to improve the area.



Paul Twivy

Paul has been an adviser to the last 3 UK Prime Ministers as well as to numerous CEO's. He is one of the best-known strategic thinkers and innovators in Branding, Innovation and Marketing Communications. His career combines founding, running and advising social movements and enterprises such as Comic Relief, Change the World for a Fiver, The Big Lunch and Your Square Mile with consultancy work advising the Boards of some of the world's best known organisations. During his 34-year career, he has started two distinctive communications agencies – Still Price Court Twivy D'Souza and Circus - and been Deputy Chairman of JWT, Group Chief Executive of Bates Dorland, Global Head of Digital Development for all Saatchi and Bates agencies and Chief Strategic Planning Officer for McCann-Erickson, EMEA. Scottish Government

The devolved government for Scotland has a range of responsibilities which include: health, education, justice, rural affairs, housing and the environment. Some powers are reserved to the UK government.

The Government is led by the First Minister. The Scottish Parliament nominates one of its Members to be appointed as First Minister by the Queen. He or she is assisted by Cabinet Secretaries (Ministers) with individual portfolios, who are appointed by him/her with the approval of Parliament. Junior Scottish Ministers are similarly appointed to assist Cabinet Secretaries in their work.

The Scottish Law Officers, the Lord Advocate and Solicitor General can be appointed from outside the Parliament's membership, but are subject to its approval. The First Minister, the Cabinet Secretaries and the Scottish Law Officers are the Members of the Scottish Government. They are collectively known as the "Scottish Ministers".

Each year the Scottish Government announces its annual Programme for Government. This sets out the Government's proposed legislation for the coming year, as well as summarising the Scottish Government's key achievements and policy goals for the future - both legislative and non-legislative.
